enny Staples was cheerful, friendly, happy, fun loving, hard-working and talented. He was also disabled, but on Wednesday, June 26, 2013, dozens of his friends and family members gathered to pay tribute and remember him for what he was able to accomplish during his brief life. Kenny, who was wheelchair-bound never let his disabilities hold him back. He led a remarkably full life as an independent adult and several speakers made note of this during a memorial celebration in his honor.

June 26 marked the tenth anniversary of Kenny's tragic passing. He was onboard a transit bus when it caught fire. He was on his way home from his job at the Good Shepherd Home in Allentown. "Kenny worked every day and arrived back at his apartment the same way as when he would depart in the morning", said BHA deputy director Mark Iampietro. "With a big happy smile on his face." Kenny's demeanor was noted by each speaker. BHA executive director Clara Kendy remarked how Kenny's smile would "light up a room." His mother, Dona Reynolds regaled the audience with stories of Kenny's epic sense of independence. "Kenny would never take no for an answer, so he never let the disabilities prevent him from living his life", she said. She shared a simple note that Kenny wrote to her following his placement at Monocacy Tower years before. In the note, Kenny described his apartment with great pride. "He loved being independent and especially being at Monocacy", she added.

As a lasting and fitting tribute to Kenny, the Authority had a plaque attached to a bench in Johnston Park and dedicated it in his honor. The bench sits within view of the fourth floor apartment on the west side of the building that he proudly called home for many years. "I feel that he is up there, watching and grinning from ear to ear", said Mrs. Reynolds who was joined by her five surviving sons, their families and other well-wishers.

Late Director Honored by **BHA**, Northeast Ministry

he Bethlehem Housing Authority and the Northeast Ministry joined forces in August to honor the memory of late Northeast Ministry executive director Steve Godbolt. The athletic complex surrounding the Marjorie B. Fink building is now named in his honor. "We discussed an honor for Steve and we agreed that naming the sports complex was most appropriate", said BHA deputy director Mark Iampietro. Steve maintained an office inside the Fink Building, where he reported every day for more than two decades, but to those who knew him, Steve spent equal time out back, encouraging his young charges. "Sports and recreation was a big part of the overall program provided through the Ministry", said BHA recreation supervisor Robbie Robinson. "Steve was involved in every aspect of the program and he really knew how important sports were in developing character", he added.

The ceremony was held August 10th, just three days after what would have been Steve's 55th birthday. On hand were Steve's parents, his seven siblings and his life mate, Virginia Forrest. Also present and speaking were BHA director Clara Kendy, Ministry board member Joane Hockenbury, Bethlehem Mayor John Callahan, Godbolt family members Natalie Seier, and Mike Godbolt, plus Ministry participants, Zach Borghi, Oliver Paulino and Ce Ce Gee. Monsignor William Baver was present to lead the group in a prayer of remembrance. The program ended with the unveiling of a sign proclaiming the area as "The Steven P. Godbolt Memorial Recreation Complex". A handsome plaque was placed inside the building lobby describing Steve and his contributions to the community.

Family Self-Sufficiency Program Success Story

This edition of our newsletter highlights yet another success story in our Family Self-Sufficiency program. We at BHA are so very proud of the achievements of all FSS participants because we constantly are reminded of the human potential that all people possess. Many of our client/participants come to us with low self-esteem. They have been told over and over that they will never amount to anything, and most end up believing this. Our task is to convince them that they can achieve anything that they put their mind to.

Lissette Rivera's story is so typical of many residents of public housing. Just when she thought she was at a dead end, Lissette was introduced to FSS here at the Housing Authority. Every obstacle that she knew prevented her from achieving success was identified and then addressed. She knew that education was a key component to success, so she obtained a high school diploma and a college degree. From there, the challenges were identified and conquered. The education and training led to a job/career. Steady employment led to cleaning up her credit and allowed her to obtain a driver's license and to the purchase of a car. With all of this behind her, Lissette was then able to focus on a seemingly impossible goal – home ownership. "Home ownership truly represents success to most of my clients because it represents commitment". Mirella Snow said. "The ability to qualify for a mortgage and then to be able to buy and own a home is the ultimate responsibility for most folks. Lissette has proven to herself and others that she has what it takes to do these things".

Lissette may have proven a thing or two to the doubters but she gives credit where credit is due. "It has taken a lot of hard work but I have to say that the support given by BHA through Mirella, the staff and this wonderful program has made everything possible. I am truly blessed and grateful for every opportunity. Any success I and my kids experience is due in large part to this program."
