ENHANCED
POLICE PRESENCE

As many of you know, we have provided "above the baseline" Policing services to our residents since 1990. By "above the baseline", we refer to non-routine Police calls on our properties.

As with any program in place for ten years, we found the need to make some changes. We feel the new arrangement will work out well for our residents and staff.

Our agreement with the Police now allows us a Sergeant and four Officers working out of the Northeast Substation on the corner of Marvine Street and Fritz Drive. All Officers are "bike certified" which means they will be easily recognizable and easily accessible to you. They will continue to patrol, either by vehicle, bike or on foot, through the family developments, high-rise buildings and BHA Community Buildings.

They are ready and willing to listen to you and work with you on any problem that you bring to their attention.

You can reach the BHA Community Patrol Officers by calling **610-865-7222** and leaving a message on their answering machine or by calling the non-emergency Police number, 610-865-7187 and requesting that Sergeant Kevin Spano return your call.

REMEMBER, if you have a Police or Medical emergency you must call 911 for the quickest response.



A big question many seniors may be asking now that **health care reform** is upon is - "How does this affect me?" As of this moment, senior citizens and older American's who are covered by Medicare will be less affected by health care reform than other citizens. Americans over 65 years of age (and some who are younger and permanently disabled) qualify for Medicare, which is funded and run by the federal government. Medicare recipients won't experience a drastic change in how they receive medical care. They won't have to worry about choosing an insurance company, whether they have to opt-in or opt-out of public coverage, or whether they will be affected by rationing. Monocacy Residents Learn Energy-saving Tips

"The power is in your hands" is more than just a catchy phrase. It also happens to be the name of a neat educational program aimed at public housing residents. One of the requirements of the Energy Performance Contract BHA entered into with the Ameresco firm is that representatives from the company visit BHA properties and provide energy saving tips to residents. The tips are an important follow up to the actual physical work that took place during the first phase of the program. "In addition to replacing old electrical and plumbing fixtures, the contractor is committed to educating the residents as to what they can do to further enhance the energy improvements" explained BHA's Director of Capital Improvements Curt Kichline. "We are well aware that in addition to the physical improvements, certain user habits may also need to be modified", he continued. "The ultimate goal is to counsel residents on the basics of energy saving." The sessions, which took place in each community this past March, were designed to explain the steps that residents can take to lend a hand. Ameresco representatives patiently explained simple tips everyone can follow regarding water use, lighting/electricity and heating. Simple, personal adjustments made by residents can further enhance overall energy savings, when added to the other physical changes that have taken place. Some of the simplest energy saving tips are probably the same ones your mother told you about while growing up. Turn off lights when you leave a room. Unplug appliances when not using them (except for your refrigerator). Keep windows closed tight to save heating or air cooling energy. Wash and dry full loads whenever possible. "These time tested tips, when used in conjunction with the adjustments we have made to the building systems will ensure that we save precious resources and dollars", said Mr. Kichline. ▲



RESIDENTS' REMINDER

The warmer weather is here and there are a couple of things I would like to share with my residents. First, use caution when considering placement of a window air conditioner. Remember that **safety codes will not allow placement of an air conditioner in any room with only one window!** Also, remember not to block any window, so that it can be used as an emergency exit in the event of fire. This means that you must not block the window with furniture or other furnishings. If you do not understand this, call us at the development office and we will gladly explain things to you.

Please report the presence of graffiti as soon as you notice it. Call maintenance at 610-865-8319. Join us as we work to make your community safe and attractive.

Remember that you can obtain grass seed to help spruce up your yard. Call the office for information. Once again, we will sponsor the "Most Beautiful Yard" contest. Plant flowers, weed your garden, apply mulch and who knows, perhaps your yard will be chosen as best in class. Hundreds of dollars in prize money will once again be made available.

On April 26th, the Bethlehem Police Department held an **informative session, designed to enlighten staff members about gangs in our communities.** Officer Bill McCauley went over a wide variety of information regarding the influx of gangs and showed slides that shed light on some of the more obvious areas of concern including gang graffiti, gang organization and the names of the various gangs already known to be present in the Lehigh Valley. The thirty five employees who attended came away with plenty of useful information. ▲

The Bethlehem Housing Authority has served the city's needy for seven decades. In our "Employee Spotlight" series, we will get to know some current associates who have put in thirty or more years with the Authority.

Millie Matos has been employed with BHA since May 7, 1973. She started her career as the secretary for the Tenant Relations office, a program funded by the Department of Welfare and state of Pennsylvania. In 1975, when the Tenant Relations office program ended she was transferred to the Deputy Executive's office as the secretary (Clerk Typist III) and was picked up on BHA's permanent payroll.

By 1989, she was assigned to work out of the Accounting Department assisting the Comptroller until 1995 when she was promoted to Assistant Manager, assigned to the family development office. She also credits the renewed emphasis on safety with improving living conditions at BHA. The community policing program has been very successful.

As we head into the busy construction months of the Summer, I can report the following progress. Work on the new Marvine gas lines is just about wrapped up; construction of the 20 new Bayard homes is moving along nicely, I would say about half way to final completion.

The ongoing renovations at Marvine are going well with 110 units currently in various stages of completion. We look to wrap these two phases up in 2011. We are planning to make some cosmetic repairs to the underside of the Marvine front porch roofs soon, and on a larger scale, we will reroof Bodder, Bartholomew and Monocacy high rises in coming months. ▲
